Code Enforcement and Social Service Agencies to help

Hoarding seems to be one of the major concerns that have been on the rise. Moreover, for seniors, it is very difficult for the problem to be fixed as it is very costly. Often many community agencies (Protective Services for the Elderly, Senior Services, Probate Court, and Mental Health Authorities) join as a team to help the senior to fix the problem.

Supportive Programs Offered

CT Home Care Program was designed to enable individuals who are at risk for institutionalization the option to stay in the community safely.

Mental Health Waiver (Working for Integration Support and Empowerment)/WISE encompass the recovery orientation adopted by the Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services. Each person in the WISE program

would participate in Person Centered Planning Process.

Money Follows the Person (MFP) is a project administered by the Department of Social Services and varies in the respect that someone is already in the nursing home to return to the community with the freedom of choice regarding where they live and the support that they will receive.

WISE vs. MFP

The major difference is MFP person is already in a nursing home, and WISE person is at risk for nursing home placement, and a WISE person has serious psychiatric disability.

Protective Services for the Elderly Department of Social Services works with individuals who are 60 years and older from physical, mental and emotional abuse, neglect and abandonment and/or financial abuse and exploitation. DSS social workers devise a plan of care aimed at assuring an elder's safety while preserving the person's right to self-determination. Under certain circumstances, the Department may apply to the Probate Court for the appointment of a Conservator whose role is to make decisions on behalf of an incompetent person.

Stamford's Hoarding Taskforce

This multi-agency task force's purpose is to coordinate with community agencies to address hoarding cases in residents, especially elderly in the city of Stamford.

Our goal is to foster and promote lines of communication across agencies, provide a better understanding of each

agencies responsibilities and limitations and develop collaborative response to assist residents who are at risk of jeopardizing their housing, their health and public's health.

The task force will develop strategies to ensure consistency in our response to safely handle these challenging situations while accumulating proper supports to address the uniqueness of each hoarding case.

Objectives of the Taskforce

- To develop a plan to address hoarding in a thoughtful and effective way.
- To develop support groups (or re-connect people)
- To develop a group of resources to help quickly address the hoarding cases we receive
- To develop a prevention program

	Dr. Cobb stated that the Health Commission is interested in understanding the process of the strategic plan, where she is the process and if the health commission can be of assistance from a higher level. Ms. Paulmeno offered to come back and do a formal	

presentation to the Health Commission at a later date. Meanwhile shared with the commissioners where they are at this point in the process.

She started on the basis of the report and has already met with the department division heads individually and in focus groups.

It began with a set questions asking the division heads to share their priorities and where they saw champions within and for their division. The group worked on refining the department mission, vision, purpose, and value statements.

Ms. Paulmeno stated that she needed to meet with Mayor Martin, Director Jankowski and the Health Commissioners for their input.

Ms. Parry expressed her interest in meeting with Ms. Paulmeno on a different level to give her input. Dr. Decker followed by stating that the Health Commissioners agreed to meet with her individually.

Ms. Paulmeno shared her professional background with the Health Commission and how it ties in what she is doing now.

She also mentioned the discussions with the health department staff about the services they provide and what may be duplicate services in the community; as well as conversations with Director Fountain about other health department applying to the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) to become an accredited health department.

The thought was while in the process of the strategic plan,

we should use PHAB format so if it is decided at a later date that the Stamford Health Department would like to apply for PHAB certification they could move forward.

Ms. Paulmeno questioned whether she should be meeting with the Social Services Commission. Ms. Fountain explained that is an interesting dynamic, although she attends their meeting. They will discuss this at another time.

Ms. Parry stated that she was assuming Ms. Paulmeno was going to use the community needs assessment that was just done by Stamford Hospital with the Health Department as an integral participant. Ms. Paulmeno said, yes. She is also pulling in much information from other sources. Organizations that she and boards that she has involvement with.

Dr. Decker spoke of the makeup of the Health Commission per the Charter; which is unlike the Board of Health in other communities. Ms. Paulmeno stated that she was very impressed with the health department staff.

Dr. Cobb questioned the scope of the strategic plan. Director Fountain said this was only for the department of health and social services.

People Friendly Stamford	Dr. Decker spoke about an email she saw from People Friendly Stamford (a civic organization that promotes walking, safe cycling, and pedestrian safety, helped to get an ordinance approved by the Board of Representatives to have future transportation projects include complete streets concepts. She thought it was interesting as it applies to transportation improvement projects; but not interstate highway, pedestrian paths or where the expense would be too great. The ordinance is called Complete Streets; it is an initiative that tries and makes the street safe for everyone; motorists, pedestrians, elderly and the	
	everyone; motorists, pedestrians, elderly and the disabled. According to this ordinance, the Office of Operations is to produce a manual for implementation of transportation improvement projects to make them amenable to complete streets.	
	It mandates inclusion of infrastructure designed to accommodate pedestrians in any projects within 1,000 feet of a school, commercial center, or bus stops.	
	Ms. Parry questioned if this was an ordinance that just passed. Dr. Decker stated it passed on January 5, 2015.
