During the vote on the Approval of Minutes, Mr. Gabriele commented on a suggestion he made at the August meeting pertaining to the possibility of the August meeting being held the third week of the month rather than the second week. She added that when the audit is completed the Board would like to have 2015-16 numbers also. Ms. Michelson was not sure when the WPCA audit would be ready but will provide that information once the audit is completed.

Also present and responding to questions were representatives from Con Edison.

As a result of discussions, the Board will be provided a signed written guarantee on cost savings and warranty and rebate information.

Mayor Martin spoke to the funding of these projects. He said that with the building of a new Police Department the City is capital restrained and this energy improvement project is an opportunity to generate a quaranteed return.

A motion to hold this item until next month was made by Mr. Gabriele who felt there was a lot of information to take in and additional information was needed.

Mayor Martin explained that every month the City delays implementation, the more the City pays. Ms. Michelson asked if the school projects are prioritized. The Mayor replied that the smaller schools will be first to start rather than the larger schools.

Mr. Freedman questioned the number of street lights in the City that City employees have already replaced with LED lights. The Mayor suggested it is more than 30% and it is part of their regular program. In response to a question from Ms. Rinaldi, the Mayor said that the street lighting project is strictly to save energy and that no new street lights are being added as part of the project. The Board would like to look at a cost analysis of the City doing the work itself rather than Con Ed. Mayor Martin responded that if the Board would like to HOLD this item then this research can be done.

In regard to the Government Center Cooling project, Mayor Martin mentioned that what Con Ed has proposed will be substantially cheaper and faster if they (Con Ed) do the work than City Engineering. He distributed photos of cooling tower leakage and emphasized the time sensitivity of this project... it could become an emergency.

Mr. Freedman called for a second to Mr. Gabriele's motion to hold approval of the appropriation. There being none, the motion failed.

Mr. Kooris then made a motion to approve the supplemental Capital Project Appropriation, which was seconded by Mr. Williams. Before a vote was taken, Mr. Freedman made a motion to amend the motion to HOLD the Street Lighting Project pending receipt of cost information and approve the appropriation in the amount of \$7,527,514.

Mr. Kooris seconded this motion.
