Why should everyone ages 12+ get the vaccine?

The Delita variant is most dangerous for people who have not gotten the vaccine. This includes kids and young people, who may be over two times more likely to get sick with Delita than previous variants. Everyone ages 12+ should get the vaccine to make sure they don't get sick.

What vaccine has been approved for children ages 12+?

The Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine.

Is the vaccine safe for children ages 12+?

If my child has had COVID-19, should they still get the vaccine?

















Town Map

Average Daily Rate of COVID-19 Cases Among Persons Living in Community Settings per 100,000 Population By Town






Stamford State of the City: COVID19 Case Trends

Stamford Mask Mandate

Stamford city-wide mask mandate was implemented on August 12 to help stem the increasing number of COVID cases.

With the declining number of new COVID cases and in concurrence with the Stamford Acting Director of Health,

Stamford's indoor mask mandate is lifted - effective immediately.


- Stamford businesses are entitled to set their own mask regulations and requirements at their discretion.
- The use of face masks/facial coverings will continued to be required in the Stamford Government Center until further notice.


Although masks will no longer be required, Stamford residents are advised to take reasonable safety precautions, practice social distancing, utilize regular handwashing and other PPE, and . . .








Vaccination Rate by Stamford Census Tract


Note – State provided data based on prior census data. Census tracts 223, 201, and 222, in particular, have lower vaccination rates than shown here based on updated census population growth.



The State of COVID in Our Schools


While a few particular situations (i.e. sports, special ed) have led to spikes in the number of close contacts quarantined, the general trend since September has been a decline in both the number of cases in our schools and the number of close contacts who have had to quarantine.





School Cases vs. City Cases

• Cases reported at our public schools have fallen steadily since late-September.

 In September, school cases did not track with the rest of the community, but that has changed in October.




More Comparisons:

 Weekly student case numbers have been falling precipitously, while staff case numbers have been holding steady.



State Contact Tracing Metrics

Department of Public Health's Goals

• 90% of COVID cases and their close contacts called within 48 hours of being identified and added to the contact tracing system.

 50% of COVID cases and contacts reached by contact tracers within 48 hours of being identified.

City of Stamford's Contact Tracing Team Results (September 2021)



 96% of COVID cases and their close contacts were called within 48 hours of being identified.



 69% of COVID cases and contacts were reached within 48 hours of being identified.

F.D.A. to Allow 'Mix and Match' Approach for Covid Booster Shots

The agency may act this week, when it is expected to authorize booster shots for recipients of the Moderna and Johnson & Johnson vaccines.

CDC October 21 Authorizations:

In addition to the existing authorization for Pfizer, the CDC's ACIP authorized COVID-19 boosters for certain individuals who received either the Moderna or J&J vaccine.

For J&J recipients:

a booster dose is recommended for anyone above the age of 18 who got the primary dose at least 2 months ago.

Recipients of the Moderna vaccine:

are eligible for a booster shot at least 6 months after the second dose of the primary series. The Moderna booster is a half-dose.

Mixing & Matching:

For a booster dose, all three Vaccines are interchangeable

(this does NOT apply for the first doses, only the booster dose

Who Should & May Get a Booster



The following individuals **should obtain a booster dose**:

- People 65 years and older and residents in long-term care settings.
- People aged 50-64 years with certain underlying medical conditions that put them at risk for severe COVID-19 such as chronic lung disease, diabetes, obesity, chronic kidney disease, cardiovascular disease, sickle cell disease, and dementia.


The following individuals *may* obtain a booster dose:

- People aged 18-49 years with these same underlying medical conditions
- People aged 18-64 who are at increased risk of exposure to COVID-19 due to their occupation, such as healthcare workers, teachers, and grocery store workers
- People aged 18-64 who live in an institutional setting



- The Food and Drug Administration voted in support of the Pfizer vaccine for kids ages 5-11 on Tuesday, 10/26.
- The vaccine is proven to combat against the Delta Variant of Covid-19 which has proven to be more contagious to children than the original strain.
- The most recent data from Pfizer's clinical trials found that the vaccine for 5-11 year olds was nearly 91% effective against symptomatic illness.
