#### Welcome/Quorum

Karen Feder welcomed all. A quorum was present and the meeting was called to order at 12:05 pm. Due to lack of quorum School Readiness Council minutes for the December, 2021 were unable to be approved.

II. School Readiness Provider Reports January 2022 – School Readiness Program Directors Provider reports are attached as Addendums A, B, C and D.

#### III. School Readiness Liaison Update – Donna Arcuri

- December Utilization(CLC) FD-340/425, ED 53/60—PD 28/28 Received full reimbursement with the 25% supplement (BOE) SD 16/16—Full reimbursement
- During the first week of January 2022, the City of Stamford distributed an average of about 10 boxes of Covid rapid tests to licensed center-based preschool providers. Fire Department and Police Department distributed these to the centers.
- The OEC offered rapid test and N95 mask distributions. Donna and a colleague picked up and distributed to each center.
- AOK picked up and distributed to Stamford's Family childcare providers. .
- Revised Memo 43 State funded programs will continue to receive a 25% Supplement until March 2022.
- School Readiness FY22 Expenditure Reports are due on January 31.
- FY22 2nd Quarter monitoring will be completed by the end of the January and reports will be provided.
- The OEC will continue to cover background check and fingerprinting cost until April 1 and available in Stamford at the Adult Education Building.
- Vaccination availability information is shared with providers as it is received.
- ECE Reporter deadline CLC may not be able to meet the deadline to have all children entered in the system. The OEC has not granted access to staff responsible for entering the date.
- The Stamford Health Department gave three presentations to childcare providers. Webinars were offered one evening and one in Spanish. These webinars were specifically tailored for family childcare providers. The third was a review and update on new guidelines.
- Staffing shortages and classroom closures in the community are also causing difficulty for preschool children receiving special education services at APPLES.
- Donna reported the results of a survey taken from Stamford center-based providers. The survey polled centers regarding staffing shortages and the effects on their program. Twenty-eight sites participate in a survey. About half of Stamford's center-based programs responded. Results are included as Addendum E.
- When classrooms are closed, special education services can only be offered virtually.
- Kendra Brown discussed the challenges in providing special education services because of differing policies from the Department of Education and the Office of Early Childhood.
- Kendra also shared the challenges of differing quarantine policies of programs and children who receive the special education services at APPLES.
- Donna suggested all in attendance bookmark the City of Stamford links for Covid-19 vaccine offerings and Covid-19 testing sites.

#### IV. Early Childhood Center Update – Kendra Brown, SPS

Kendra reiterated that Stamford was accepted and is on the list to build an early childhood center in.

- Facilities meetings are ongoing and Kendra will continue to provide information as she learns it.
- 20% of the cost will be reimbursed by the State of Ct and the remainder of the cost will be the responsibility of the City.

#### V. Covid-19 Early Childhood Updates- Nathalie Tocci, Care to Care Manager – Family Centers Nurse Consultant

- Nathalie gave a public thank you to Stamford's Health Department and the support they have provided to childcare providers.
- Nathalie announced she will wait to hear Commissioner Beth Bye's announcement tomorrow.
- 5 day Quarantine is meant for adults who after 5 days with no symptoms can return to work if they can remain masked and isolate.
- Children under 5 years old are unable to mask like an adult.

Provided separate entrances and traffic patterns in the building. Children and teachers are required to wear masks. Teachers provide children mask breaks through-out the day. Family members are also required to wear a mask for drop off and pick up. Families do not enter our buildings.

#### **Classroom Learning Experiences**

This month's areas of focus are Winter and Hibernation

Some of the children's literature used in January's learning experience plans:

- The Lonely Snowflake-Patrick Stemp
- Pete the Cat Snow Daze- James Dean
- Chicken Soup with Rice Maurice Sendak
- The Mitten -Jan Brett
- Bear Snores On- Karma Wilson

Examples of learning experiences extended from the books read:

- The children learned winter songs and rhymes
- Teacher lead discussions consisting of open ended questions about winter, changes taking place with the weather and how these changes affect animals and people
- In the block area children explored and used recycled materials, blocks, and winter animals to create winter scenes and structures; such as snow covered mountains, ice castles, caves, etc.
- Pretend play and winter dress up in the dramatic play area
- Mitten counting and sorting experiences
- Water and ice investigation in the sensory table
- Using playdough, the children made snowballs of different sizes, ordered them by size and counted them

- Working with different art materials the children made snow people and snowflakes
- Using the book, Bear *Snores On*, and a flannel board, teachers had the children put the animal characters into the cave in the order they went in as told in the story
- The children enjoyed acting out the story, *The Mitten* as the teacher assisted them with taking turns and encouraged them to choose their own characters. Props were made by the children such as, various mittens of all sizes and texture

#### **Home/School Connection Activities:**

- Links to winter stories were sent home on google classroom for the children to listen to with their families. After listening to the stories they were asked to draw a picture of their favorite characters and also share with their friends (on google classroom) which story and characters were their favorites.
- After learning about and discussing hibernation at school the teacher sent home a heart shaped piece of cardboard, cereal and a string. The families were asked to spread cream cheese or butter onto the heart shaped cardboard and then cover it with the cereal. The string was added so the bird feeder could be hung outside. The children were instructed to watch from their window and share with their teacher and classmates what type of birds they observed visiting the feeder. The families posted on google classroom pictures of the heart shaped bird feeders they had made.










Has your program had staff shortages that impacted classroom closures? <sup>28 responses</sup>

Staff got hit with COVID during Winter Break, making it impossible to open 1/3 to 1/7/22. Last year, September 2020 to August 2021, we could not find staff to hire. It was a very challenging year.

STAFFING IS IMPOSSIBLE WITH COVID AND OEC REQUIREMENT OF HAVING ALL STAFF FINGERPRINTED PRIOR TO STARTING AND FINGERPRINT APPOINTMENTS ARE RARELY AVAILABLE DUE TO COVID

We are very small, only have 4 staff members but quarantine requirements have been impacting our operations through the pandemic. We also list must if our substitutes.

We had to close a classroom last week due to staff shortages that were due to covid

I have had two teachers leave in December due to better paying jobs.
