#### III. School Readiness Liaison Update – Donna Arcuri

- The October, 2021SRC minutes were approved via email on October 27.
- October Utilization (CLC) FD-314/425, / ED 46/60 PD-28/28 deficit reimbursement -\$-150 (BOE) SD 16/16- Full reimbursement
- November Utilization(CLC) FD-336/425, ED 49 /60—PD 28/28 Received full reimbursement with the 25% supplement (BOE) SD 16/16—Full reimbursement
- OEC's required "Waivers of Hour's" requests were provided to the School Readiness programs. At this time, Stamford programs are operating at their regular hours.
- Kindergarten Info night was a success and was held virtually on Oct. 26. It was offered in both English and Spanish and about 95 attendees were present combined in both sessions.
- SR program Expenditure reports were provided to appointed SRC members on October 27 for review.
- FY22 1st Q monitoring reports were made available to members for review
- FY22 2nd Quarter monitoring will begin in December which will include Quality Component review and community collaborations.
- The OEC will continue to cover background check and fingerprinting cost until April 1 and sessions are available in Stamford at the Adult Education Building.
- English as a second language class information and locations have been provided to programs.
- All Books from Read to Grow have been distributed. Donna asked that families to share pics to Linda at Read to Grow.
- Technology assistance is being offered at the Ferguson Library. Spanish, Creole, Arabic, English. Free internet connectivity.
- Classroom closures have begun community wide.
- Vaccination availability information is sent to providers as it is received.
- The Stamford SRC parent participant Tara Stickney will be moving out of state. She will be missed.
- It was announced that Helma Gregorich will be retiring at the end of December as Manager and Clinical Supervisor of Nurturing Families Network and Parents as Teachers Andrea Payo will take over for Helma as Clinical Supervisor and Nurturing in the Parents as Teachers program.

# V. BOE at Rippowam Fee Request – Donna Arcuri

- Stamford SRC Voting Members were provided a written Out of Town Residency Enrollment request prior to the meeting. A voting member roll call was taken. Members unanimously approved the request. Documentation will be sent to Emily Goldschmid of CLC.
- Due to the multiple BOE SR classroom at Rippowam classroom closures due to Covid, a request was made not to collect fees for the month of December, 2021 in this classroom. # VI. Building One Community Programs and Services – Alejandra Gomez Building One Community Workforce Development - Emendya Diaz

- Alejandra provided information on the updated website and how to find information.
- The four pillars of Building One Community are Engage, Employ, Empower and Educate.
- Current available programs and events were explained. Such as legal services, immigration services, domestic violence, legal clinics, family services, tax assistance, housing, medical and mental health, tax prep, workforce development,
- Emendya explained the best way to register or learn about workforce development programs is through the website.
- The monthly newsletter as well as the website provides information on skill development.
- Soft skill classes on resume, letter writing, entrepreneur, technology classes and lending library are available.
- The hiring site helps workers and employees connect.
- Information was shared with the attendees to share.

#### VII. Mayor's Education Sub-committee Transition Team Update (EC Focus) - Lauren Secko-Pagan

- Lauren reported that the topic of Early Childhood Education was one of the main topics discussed.
- She reported that the committee discussed the lack of subsidized preschool in Stamford.
- The explanation for the lack of more state-funded preschool applicants are the cost and time it takes for NAEYC accreditation. It is felt both could be spent on more productive ways in the classroom.
- More mental health support for the kids in the school district.
- Physical condition of the school buildings.
- Kendra Brown updated the SRC on the SPS early childhood building grant application.
- Kendra reminded the SRC and attendees that if the funding is approved, the building will house 36 classrooms.
- 636 students that would include CLC and SPS staff are optimistic that 250 of those students will be students from community programs. This can be an opportunity to provide families with more choice in a state-funded program.

# **Classroom Learning Experiences**

October Focus:

Autumn and the Change of Seasons, Transportation, Organic Gardening

#### Autumn and the Change of Seasons:

- Observation of the changing seasons and documentation of what we see by drawing pictures and painting things such as leaves and pumpkins. Songs and Fingerplay such as, 'The Five Little Pumpkins' were introduced
- Read Alouds included, *Leaves* by David Ezra and *Chrysanthemum* by Kevin Henkes

# Transportation/Focus on Vehicles:

- A classroom's dramatic play area was transformed into a train station, with a child made train, ticket booth, railroad tracks, etc. Later in the month the train station was transformed into car wash center.
- Read Aloud included, Follow the Track All the Way Back by Timothy Knapman & Ben Mantle

#### Organic Gardening:

- Classes discovered and explored pumpkins that were grown in our pumpkin patch. Seeds were gathered from last year's classroom pumpkins. Children planted these seeds in containers and watched them grow in their classrooms. In the spring mature plants were transplanted into our CLC pumpkin patch. Children observed and documented the growth until 4 beautiful pumpkins were harvested. The classrooms all had a turn to examine the pumpkins and guess its weight.
- Mint harvesting continued and children each took home mint along with recipes and instructions on how to dry the mint.
- Read Aloud included, How Big Did Your Pumpkin Grow by Barrie Watts.

#### **Home/School Connection Activity**

Every month teachers send home an activity for families to do with their child. They are asked to share pictures on Google Classroom of the child and family engaging in the particular activity. The child also shares the at home activity/ photos with his/her classmates. As an October home/school activity one Child Development classroom asked families to share their home culture virtually by preparing a family recipe, dancing or reading a favorite book.
