I. Welcome/Quorum

Karen Feder welcomed all. A quorum was present and the meeting was called to order at 12:07 pm. School Readiness Council minutes for the December, 2021 and January, 2022 were unanimously approved.

II. School Readiness Provider Reports February, 2022 – School Readiness Program Directors Provider reports are attached as Addendums A, B, C and D and were sent to members and attendees prior to the meeting. No questions were asked.

III. School Readiness Liaison Update - Donna Arcuri

- January School Readiness Utilization (CLC) FD-339/425, ED 57/60—PD 28/28. CLC received full reimbursement with the 25% supplement from the OEC. (BOE) SD 16/16—Full reimbursement. Still underutilized. This is a state-wide problem mostly in programs that serve economically disadvantaged families.
- The City of Stamford previously offered child care providers two opportunities to fill gallon containers with hand sanitizer.
- The City of Stamford will now make available surgical masks. Centers will be able to pick up 1000. Donna provided information to all childcare centers.
- Expenditure Report due date has been extended to Feb 28.
- FY22 2nd Q monitoring is completed.
- OEC / 211 Fingerprinting events have been moved to the 6th Floor Training room at the Government Center.
- Community RFP is due Sunday, May 8 at 11:59. Two weeks earlier than usual
- The proposed due date for applications April 1 by 3pm. These will be time stamped upon receipt.
- Applications will be distributed to reviewers on April 4 and 5. The reviewer meeting will be held virtually and in person the week of the 11th.
- The SRC needs 5 volunteer application reviewers as well as volunteers to visit the sites of any new applicants. A rubric will be provided. Karen, Joe, Liz, Maura?
- I would like to propose a special SRC meeting on Thursday, April 21 to vote on SR and QE allocations.
- School Readiness and CDC reimbursement rates have not increased in many years.
- Donna provided statistics throughout the state of CT.
 - Across the state, childcare staff are leaving for better paying jobs in other fields.
 - As of March 7, Indeed showed active listings for 750 preschool teachers, 315 Assistant teachers and 260 infant toddler teachers in CT.
 - Across the state providers, report very few inquiries for employment.
 - Potential candidates with no experience are demanding higher wages than veteran staff.
 - Thousands of children are not able to attend subsidized ECE programs in school readiness and CDC programs due to lack of staff to open classrooms.
 - These problems are widespread across the industry.
- The early childhood Alliance took a poll of providers shows that 62% of early childhood programs are now operating at a loss.
- Donna reminded attendees of the local poll taken from Stamford providers. Results were 60% of the programs polled had staff shortages that affected classroom closures, 60% of Stamford's programs have chosen not to enroll at full capacity because of the fear of staffing shortages.
- Karen Feder added that Birth to 3 staff have not received an increase in funding and are also unable to hire qualified staff.

Vocabulary words: axle, rim, brakes, crank, revolve, roll, rotate, inflate, tire, radius, cylinder, spokes, deflate

Blocks: Garage-Explore a variety of vehicles with wheels. Build ramps using wooden blocks. Test the speed of vehicles.

Dramatic play: Repair shop- C will repair broken objects that have wheels with tools.

Math: counting wheels on objects, compare the shape of wheels on objects, measure wheels, and sort wheels by type

Art: marble painting, make "VEHICLES" with creative junk: toilet paper roll, bottle top, food boxes, painting with cars and making tire prints, learn about color wheel and use it to select colors for painting

Writing: Write and dictate drawings & investigations about wheels, visuals of wheels to refer to when writing

Sensory Bin: Little Blue Truck retell sensory bin (sand, story prop materials)

Science: Ramp experiment: which ramp helps the car go faster? (higher ramp/shorter ramp) How do we need to place the ramp for the cars to go? Etc.

Literacy: fiction and nonfiction books about wheels

Homeschool Connection: Family 3-D wheels project, Culture week study, Google Classroom, ClassDojo, Parent Teacher Conferences

Social Studies: Every Friday virtual field trip: garage, car wash, amusement park, car show

Examples of learning experiences extended from the books read:

- The children learned songs and rhymes about love, kindness, postal workers, mail and community helpers
- Teacher lead discussions consisting of open ended questions on the above focus areas
- Children worked in the art area making a classroom friendship collage and shiny one of a kind individual rainbow fish.
- Through development of their fine motor skills the children created the letters in their names and the names of others. Some are forming letters while others are strengthening their skills by getting used to the movement and feel of holding a writing tool
- While learning about friendship and feelings the class discussed how music can make us feel. At the science table instruments of differing sizes and shapes were displayed for children to explore. The children experimented with the sounds that the instruments make and how each made them feel
- After discussing certain jobs and how these jobs help our community the children enjoyed dressing as various community helpers and playing the part
- At the math center, children were given the opportunity to make a sensory bag using gel and pom poms, counting the number of pomp oms they put in the bag
- The children were introduced to Alma Woodsey, the first Black woman to have a show at the Whitney Museum of American Art and to have work acquired by the White House. After observing and discussing the different pieces she painted the children, inspired by her works, painted their own pictures.

Home/School Connection Activities:

- The children and their teachers danced together at school and talked about how dancing made them feel. After checking in on the mood meter they noticed most of the class was in the yellow and feeling happy and energetic. Families were asked to dance at home with their family and talk about how they feel when dancing together. The teacher also asked the families to upload a video on google classroom of the family dancing that the teacher would share with their friends at school
- Supplies were sent home so each family could make a sensory bottle with their child. Families posted pictures on google classroom of the sensory bottles the children made and were later shared at school with their friends.
- A short video about black female artist, Alma Woodsey's life and artwork was shared with the families
 on google classroom. Using her work as inspiration, the families were asked to paint something
 together, take a picture of it, and share it on google classroom for all to enjoy.

Addendum E

OVERVIEW

Purpose:

The Office of Early Childhood (OEC) shall establish a program, within available appropriations, to provide on a competitive basis supplemental quality enhancement grants to providers of child day care services or providers of school readiness programs pursuant to Connecticut General Statute (C.G.S.) Section 10-16p and Section 10-16u to enhance the quality of early childhood education programs. Child day care providers and school readiness programs in priority school districts and competitive school readiness municipalities may apply for a quality enhancement grant. These applicants must use their local School Readiness Council to review and recommend projects for funding.

The purpose of the QEGP is to provide funding for early care and education programs to address quality standards and/or expand comprehensive services for children and families. C.G.S. Section 17b-749c identifies the following as appropriate use of grant funds:

- 1. Help providers who are not accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children to obtain such accreditation;
- 2. Help directors and administrators to obtain training;
- 3. Provide comprehensive services, such as enhanced access to health care, a health consultant, a mental health consultant, nutrition, family support services, parent education, literacy and parental involvement, and community and home outreach programs; and provide information concerning access when needed to a speech and language therapist;
- 4. Purchase educational equipment;
- 5. Provide scholarships for training to obtain a credential in early childhood education or child development;
- 6. Provide training for persons who are mentor teachers, as defined in federal regulations for the Head Start program, and provide a family service coordinator or a family service worker as such positions are defined in such federal regulations;
- 7. Repair fire, health and safety problems in existing facilities and conduct minor remodeling to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act; train child care providers on injury and illness prevention; and achieve compliance with national safety standards;
- 8. Create a supportive network with family day care homes and other providers of care for children;
- 9. Provide for educational consultation and staff development;
- 10. Provide for program quality assurance personnel;
- 11. Provide technical assistance services to enable providers to develop child care facilities pursuant to C.G.S. Sections 17b-749g, 17b-749h and 17b-749i;
- 12. Establish a single point of entry system; and
- 13. Provide services that enhance the quality of programs to maximize the health, safety and learning of children from birth to three years of age, inclusive, including, but not limited to, those children served by informal child care arrangements. Such grants may be used for the improvement of staff to child ratios and interaction, initiatives to promote staff retention, pre-literacy development, parent involvement, curriculum content and lesson plans.
