Stamford Planning Board Members present were: Voting Members: Theresa Dell, Chair; Jay Tepper, Vice Chair; Claire Fishman, Secretary; Jennifer Godzeno and Michael Totilo. Alternates: William Levin and Roger Quick. Present for Land Use Bureau staff: David W. Woods, PhD, AICP, Principal Planner and Erin McKenna, Associate Planner. Other City officials present: Rodney Pratt, Board of Representatives-District 9; Michael Handler, Director of Administration; Jay Fountain, Acting Director of Office of Policy & Management; Anthony Romano, Management Analyst-Office of Policy & Management; Ellen Bromway, Director of Social Services; Al Barbarotta, Board of Education.

Ms. Dell started the session calling for a motion to hold a Special Meeting on Tuesday, January 31, 2017. Mr. Tepper moved to hold the Special Meeting on January 31, 2017; Ms. Godzeno seconded the motion and passed unanimously with eligible members present voting, 5-0 (Dell, Fishman, Godzeno, Totilo and Tepper).

### <u>CAPITAL BUDGET PRESENTATIONS FY2017/2024</u>: CAPITAL BUDGET 2017-2018 & CAPITAL PLAN 2018-2024

Ms. Dell then opened the Public Hearing on the Capital Budget 2017-2018 at 7:05 p.m., and explained to the audience how the process of speaking was to take place. Ms. Dell called upon Ms. Fishman to read into the record the legal notice of this meeting, as follows:

# LEGAL NOTICE PLANNING BOARD OF THE CITY OF STAMFORD

In accordance with Section C8-20-5 of the Stamford Charter, the STAMFORD PLANNING BOARD will hold a Public Hearing on Tuesday, January 24, 2017, at 7:00 P.M., Government Center Building, 4th Floor Cafeteria, 888 Washington Blvd., Stamford, CT; if weather conditions do not permit holding this Public Hearing, the alternate date will be Tuesday, January 31, 2017 to hear public comments on the recommended CAPITAL BUDGET for the 2017-2018 and the CAPITAL PLAN 2018-2024. Copies of the budget document are available in the Land Use Bureau Office, 7th Floor, Government Center Building, during regular business hours; on the City's website at <a href="https://www.cityofstamford.org">www.cityofstamford.org</a>, "City Departments drop down menu / Planning / Planning Board Draft Recommended Capital Budget 2017-2018 & Capital Plan 2018-2024"; and at the Public Hearing.

The meeting place is accessible to the physically impaired. Deaf and hearing impaired persons wishing to attend this meeting and requiring an interpreter may make arrangements by contacting the department of Social Services Administration Office at (203) 977-4050 at least four working days prior to the meeting.

Ms. Dell called the names for speakers from the original sign in sheet (Attachment #1) as follows:

- <u>Erin McKenna</u> introduced two-part projects that she hoped would encourage the Planning Board to increase the funding authorizations for: (1) Veteran's Park; and (2) Lione Park (*submitted 5 pictures Attachment #2*). Both of these parks have considerable support from profit and non-profit agencies such as DSSD for Veteran's Park and The Boys & Girls Club for Lione Park. Ms. McKenna introduced Archie Elam, The Stamford Veterans Council & Commander, District 1 CT VFW, as well as Chris Unger, a member of The Stamford Veterans Council and requested time to talk about Lione Park after the Veteran's Park speakers finished, with Board of Representative, Rodney Pratt.
- Commander Archie Elam submitted a letter on behalf of The Stamford Veterans Council (Attachment #3) to the Planning Board and discussed Veteran's Municipal Park as potentially a focal point for the City of Stamford's citizens and visitors, whereas now, it is "a little bit dirty and grungy." Commander Elam argued that "from The Stamford Veterans Council's point of view, the proposed reduction from \$1.9 million to \$500,000.00 will have significant (and perhaps) unintended impacts:
  - -There is a dollar-to-dollar match of funds between the private and public stakeholders. We have a terrific partnership and great support. This proposed reduction will signal to donors and stakeholders that the City has a limited commitment to the recognition of its veterans. This will limit the willingness and depth of their giving to and support for this very important project.
  - The cost of the project will be considerably higher if done in two parts. This segmentation will also raise risks in the areas of fundraising, overall support/perception of the effort and construction execution.

As a result, I am requesting that the Planning Board re-evaluate its earlier decision and restore the full amount to \$1.9 million.

- Chris Unger reiterated Commander Elam's points.
- <u>Dan Stolzenbach</u>, General Manager of Stamford Town Center, discussed the efforts that Stamford Town
  Center was undertaking to raise matching funds and from a business model, how important a
  functioning and beautiful park adjacent to the Mall is important from an economic benefits standpoint
  for the whole City.
- <u>John Ruotolo</u>, Vice President Operations, Stamford Downtown Special Services District, supported the similar efforts that the DSSD was doing to raise funds, which he stated was approximately 85% of their half.

[Staff received a letter from Mr. Ruotolo on Thursday, January 26, 2017 as follow up to his testimony at the Public Hearing. (Attachment #4)

- Alice Knapp, President-Ferguson Library, thanked the Planning Board for recommending the \$60,000.00 for computer upgrades but is requesting that the Planning Board include the request for new flooring at the Harry Bennett Library if not for this year, at least for next year. Ms. Dell pointed out that the reason the Planning board did not recommend funding for the Harry Bennett Library flooring was due to the understanding that the life expectancy of the product they were requesting was 10 years instead of for 20-25 years which would make this either an Operations item or Short Term Capital. Ms. Knapp responded by assuring the Board that the proposed flooring will be functional for 20-30 years.
- Christie Fountain, President of the Glenbrook Neighborhood Association, submitted a letter on behalf of the Glenbrook Neighborhood Association (Attachment #5) in support of the \$300,000.00 that the Planning Board is recommending for traffic safety and mobility projects. The projects that the City can use these funds for will save lives and advance the City's "Safe Streets Program." Ms. Fountain pointed out that the Hubbard Heights Association is also sending a letter in support of these funds.

[Staff received the letter from Michael D. de Milt, President of the Hubbard Heights Association, also supporting these funds after close of business on Tuesday, January 24, 2017 before the Public Hearing and Dr. Woods will submit to the Board at the January 31, 2017 meeting. (Attachment #6)]

- <u>Pamela Coleman</u>, Chair, Stamford Historical Society, also thanked the Board for including funds in support of the Stamford Historical Society but requested more funds to address their parking lot that has been beaten up by the trucks during the move of the Hoyt-Barnum House to the Stamford Historical Society.
- Al Barbarotta, Board of Education, spoke briefly on the Board of Education's Short Term Capital request in which he stated that the Board of Education was meeting on Wednesday, January 25, 2017 to develop a new solution to the total funds requested. (Mr. Barbarotta submitted a letter from Earl Kim, Superintendent of Schools - Attachment #7.)

#### PLANNING BOARD MEETING MINUTES:

Meeting of 1/10/17: After a brief discussion, Mr. Totilo moved to recommend approval of the Planning Board Minutes of January 10, 2017; Ms. Godzeno seconded the motion, and passed unanimously with eligible members present voting, 5-0 (Dell, Fishman, Godzeno, Totilo, and Tepper).


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## **The Stamford Veterans Council**

To Members of the Stamford Planning Board:

Please reconsider and restore the original funding programmed for the Veteran's Park Memorial project. Your proposed reduction from \$1.9Mil to \$500K will have significant (and perhaps) unintended impacts:

- There is a dollar-to-dollar match of funds between the private and public stakeholders. We have a terrific partnership and great support. This proposed reduction will signal to donors and stakeholders that the city has a limited commitment to the recognition of its veterans. This will limit the willingness and depth of their giving to and support for this very important project.
- The cost of the project will be considerably higher if done in two parts. This segmentation will also raise risks in the areas of fundraising, overall support/perception of the effort and construction execution.

The renovation of the city's Veterans Park is much needed and overdue. The park's rating on places where donors/interested people would go like Internet location evaluator Yelp gives us 3-stars out of 5. (see: https://www.yelp.com/biz/veterans-memorial-park-stamford)

Their comment: "Veterans Memorial Park is a park in transition. Right now it's a little bit dirty and grungy, sort of a collection of random monuments in the shadow of the Stamford Town Center shopping mall. There are a lot of people who wander around aimlessly, or are waiting for buses. It really isn't much of a park to hang out in right now."

This park is there to honor our city's veterans. More than 4,000 of them are buried around the Stamford area. It is now underutilized and sometimes used for nefarious activities. We would like it to reflect the best of what the city is and be a safe, clean, open public space and an integral hub for bus travel and east-west transportation and boosting the vitality of adjacent businesses.

Dear Ms. Dell and members of the Planning Board,

Thank you for allowing us to provide testimony last evening on behalf of Capital Budget funding for Veterans' Park restoration. There are three important items I would like to follow up on.

First, Ms. Godzeno asked about the cost of law enforcement at the park. Although we cannot put a cost on this, the most recent data gathered indicates there were 122 police calls to Veterans' Park in the two-year period of 2012 and 2013. Assault, disorderly conduct and drug violations were among the most frequent, accounting for 50 calls.

Second, Ms. Godzeno asked about the level of use at the adjacent bus stop. It is a transit hub for CT Transit at which 8 routes originate and all other local and regional routes pass through. An average of 900 riders board at Veterans' Park daily. A significant goal of the Veterans' Park Master Plan is to bring the passenger facilities up to a standard that respects the commuter and can handle the volume.


Third, in reference to the criteria you pointed out last night, there is a significant grant component to this project. Our committee and design firm have been working with the city Traffic Engineering Department to make application for a \$2m Local Transportation Capital Improvement (LOTCIT) grant. This is a 100% grant which would reduce a \$7.5m project to the \$5.5m the private sector will share with the city. We are well down the road in the grant process and are optimistic that it will come to fruition. Attached here you will find a map illustrating the scope and design of that component. It is one of the most important parts of the plan because it serves as a grand entrance and welcome mat, inviting both pedestrians and transit passengers into the park or through to the many destinations surrounding it.

Thank you again for hearing our testimony. Please consider funding this project to the level requested by the department.

# 504 Glenbrook Road will be ready for occupancy by late summer of 2017

Transit-Oriented
Development (TOD) took
another big step in
Glenbrook this year. TOD
is the planning of places
around transit not focused
on cars. This 43-unit
apartment building with a
restaurant on the ground
floor is taking shape on the
site of the former Joe G's
Nursery at 504 Glenbrook
Road. It was hard to
imagine what a four-story
building would look like on

the property until the steel beams were put in place this summer. The Village Commercial District zoning requires the fourth story to be set back from the edge of the building, as can be seen in the photo.

The Glenbrook Neighborhood Association has been involved in this planning process since we first started meeting in 1999. Glenbrook's train station area was rezoned as a Village Commercial District (VCD) in 2009 to encourage new construction with retail at street level and residences above. The greater density promotes a walkable neighborhood and more support for local businesses.

# Glenbrook Q&A

Some of the things people have asked us about this year...

# **Q:** What is the plan for the Courtland Avenue intersection at Taylor Reed Place and Maple Tree Avenue?

A: Reconstruction of the intersection will include a wider turning radius for big rigs, and marked crosswalks and pedestrian signals on all four sides. The project has three phases.

(1) Relocation of poles is in progress and is being done by the utility companies. (2) Construction of new curb lines should begin in October, with work being done by the City of Stamford. (3) Permanent traffic signal work will be done in 2017 by the State DOT.

#### Q. What's happening at the old Roly Poly location on Hope Street?

A: The new tenant told us this summer that he hopes to open a Mediterranean eatery there in the fall.

# Q: The former Sclafani warehouse at 482 Glenbrook Road (most recently a pet supply store) has had a facelift and looks great, but what is it being used for?

**A:** The new owner, Jim Lyman, Founder and CEO of View Entertainment, is keeping the building for his own use. It is off the market for lease.

# Q: I'm curious about Glenbrook Industrial Park at 652 Glenbrook Road. What's it like inside?

**A:** We asked a Glenbrook commercial photographer who moved his studio there from Manhattan in 2002. He likes the high ceilings and giant windows, and, for practicality, the loading dock and freight elevators. GNA has learned that the complex will be included in a statewide inventory of historic industrial sites for the Connecticut Trust for Historic Preservation. GNA will have a future program about it at one of our quarterly meetings.

#### Q: What are GNA quarterly meetings like?

A: We start on time at 7:30 and this year will try to end by 8:30. People can leave early if they must or stay to mix and mingle until 9:00. More than 60 people attend, with a nice diversity of ages. Visitors have commented on our friendly atmosphere. First timers as well as all business members and elected officials are given the opportunity to introduce themselves. This makes it easier to approach strangers during the social time. We move quickly through an agenda packed with information. Then we have a short program relevant to Glenbrook, with the speaker staying afterwards to answer questions one on one. There's always a satisfying buzz in the room during the social time after a meeting.

GNA members connect with the neighborhood in new ways

A Glenbrook couple that likes to walk was on their way to the GNA meetup in August. As they were waiting to cross Hope Street, they saw a man they often see walking in their neighborhood but have never spoken to. "I wonder if he's going where we're going," they said. Subject: Computer Replacement Funding

I am writing to inform you of a short-term capital project (CPB609-District Wide Computer Equipment Replacements) in the amount of \$2,000,000 that was not funded as part of this year's Board of Education capital projects. I hope the Planning Board will consider adding at least partial funding for this critical capital project in the amount of \$500,000 on the joint recommendation of City IT and the Board of Education.

Since 2000, the Board of Education has received funding to replace computers annually. This is the first year since inception that the BOE will not have funding available for computer replacement. Historically, we have made every effort, working in collaboration with the City's IT department, to maintain a 5-year replacement cycle for the nearly 5,000 desktop computers in service.

Although capital funding has allowed for replacements, we have not been able to establish a 5-year replacement cycle. In many instances we have computers that are in excess of 7 years old. The lack of funding for replacing the computer inventory in the 2017-2018 calendar year will create the following challenges:

- Having computers in excess of 5 years old increases the cost of maintenance and support. By IT
  estimates, for every year in service over 6 years, the maintenance and repair cost is in excess of 30% of
  the actual replacement cost.
- 2. The actual operating system of a computer that is in excess of 5 years old is no longer supported by Microsoft's operating system, which means security patches are no longer produced. This not only makes the actual computer vulnerable but also raises concerns for the entire computer network.
- 3. Educational time will be lost as machines will fail more frequently.
- 4. Future BOE curriculum software cannot be purchased as newer software will not run on older computers.

Additionally, we have been working with City IT and building principals to move to a cheaper yet educationally sound option (i.e., Google Chromebooks) where appropriate. The \$500,000 in additional funding combined with this new strategic approach to reduce costs will allow us to continue to provide appropriate educational programing for our students for the 2017-2018 school year.

I hope the Planning Board will consider the financial, educational and programming implications of not investing in computer replacement for our schools and will restore partial funding for this vital program.
