- March 6: New cleaning & visitor protocols at Gov't Center
- March 8: Governor Lamont announced Connecticut's first COVID-19 positive case, a Wilton resident
- March 10:
 - The City presents it's budget to the Board of Finance and Board of Representatives
 - City announces it is minimizing nonmandatory meetings and out-of-state travel restricted for City employees
 - Senior Center cancels activities
 - Stamford Hospital reports its first symptomatic patient
 - Lamont declares a public health emergency
- March 11: First case of Stamford resident
- 1,000 cases in Stamford in 4 weeks















State of the City: COVID19 Neighborhood Case Levels

Neighborhood is "PurpleRed" with Coronavirus




January Neighborhood Map






State of the City: COVID19 Hospitalization Rate





State of Connecticut: Covid 19 Vaccination Rate








STORY OF THE STORY

New Mask Guidance from CDC March 8, 2021

- Evidence that fully vaccinated people are
 - not likely to get sick from COVID-19,
 - less likely to have asymptomatic COVID infection, and
 - less likely to transmit to others
 - People are considered fully vaccinated at 2 weeks after their second dose of Pfizer or Moderna, or 2 weeks after they have received the single-dose vaccine (J&J/Janssen).
- The following recommendations apply to non-healthcare settings only Fully vaccinated people can:
 - Visit with other fully vaccinated people indoors without wearing masks or physical distancing (?numbers)
 - Visit with unvaccinated people from a single household who are at low risk for severe COVID-19 disease indoors without wearing masks or physical distancing (e.g. visiting children and grandchildren)
 - No requirement to quarantine and test following a known exposure if asymptomatic (does not apply to congregate settings)







New Mask Guidance from CDC March 8, 2021

- For now, fully vaccinated people should continue to:
 - Continue precautions in public -- wear a well-fitted mask, physically distance, avoid crowds and practice frequent hand hygiene
 - Wear masks and adhere to other prevention measures when visiting with unvaccinated people who are at increased risk for severe COVID-19 disease or who have unvaccinated household members who are at increased risk for severe disease.
 - Wear masks and adhere to other prevention measures when visiting with unvaccinated people from multiple households.
 - Avoid medium- and large-sized in-person gatherings
 - Preference for outdoor visiting in all situations.
 - Get tested if experiencing COVID-19 symptoms; isolate if positive
 - Follow CDC and health department travel requirements and recommendation (no change at present)

COVID-19 Restrictions for Businesses

- Protocols that will remain in effect until further notice include:
 - Face coverings and masks continue to be required
 - Bars that only serve beverages continue to remain closed
 - 11PM closing time remains in place for events at venues, restaurants, and entertainment
 - Indoor theaters continue to have a 50% capacity
 - Large event venues (e.g. stadiums) to open in April

STATE OF THE STATE

COVID-19 Restrictions for Businesses

Beginning Friday, March 19, 2021

- All capacity limits will be eliminated for the following businesses, while face coverings, social distancing, and other cleaning and disinfecting protocols will continue to be required:
 - Restaurants (8-person table capacity and 11PM required closing time for dining rooms continues)
 - Retail, Personal services
 - Indoor recreation (excludes theaters, which will continue to have a 50% capacity)
 - Gyms/fitness centers
 - Libraries, Museums, aquariums, and zoos
 - Offices
 - Houses of worship





COVID-19 Restrictions for Businesses

Beginning Friday, March 19, 2021

- Gathering sizes will be revised to the following amounts:
 - Social and recreational gatherings at private residence – 25 indoors/100 outdoors
 - Social and recreational gatherings at commercial venues – 100 indoors/200 outdoors
- All sports will be allowed to practice and compete, and all sports tournaments will be allowed, subject to Department of Public Health guidance
- Connecticut's travel advisory will be modified from a requirement to recommended guidance





COVID-19 Restrictions for Businesses

Beginning Monday, March 29, 2021

 Capacity limits on early childhood classes will increase from 16 to 20

Beginning Friday, April 2, 2021

- Outdoor amusement parks can open
- Outdoor event venues can increase to a 50% capacity, capped at 10,000 people
- Indoor stadiums can open at 10% capacity
- Summer camps and summer festivals are advised to begin the planning stages to open for the upcoming season


