# **Nomination of Chair**

<u>Motion</u> – Ted Jankowski nominates Randy Skigen to for Chair position, seconded by Paul Waldron, and Randy accepts Chairmanship.

# **Review of Rules and Regulations**

Took 1.5 years to pass, dense regulations. Group should read over and be familiar for next meeting.

Public Safety would like to address the issue of illegal dumping initially. Discussion of illegal dumping, costs City taxpayers \$50k per month (estimate from Operations). In addition to that, factor in the cost of lost disposal fees. Chief Fontneau stresses that deterrence is the goal of the any initiative to prevent dumping.

Traffic cameras are not under surveillance. Chief Fontneau will share locations of traffic cameras to committee (Attachment A). Discussion of Operations Office debris pick-up and addressing spots of heavy abuse. New cameras for this purpose.

Next meeting dumping location requests should be ready, Committee members should be familiar with document

# **Mayor Martin Addresses Committee**

Mayor greets group (30:54), discusses

- Wants cameras to be effective to prevent crime, especially illegal dumping
- There may be errors in, or updates to, the Policy document, and those can be changed
- His hope that playground surveillance will occur in the future
- Notify district representatives as to where cameras are
- The goal is that by enforcing a few locations, which will prevent dumping in other locations due to perception. "Subject to Surveillance" – area that may or may not have a camera, but they can think there's a camera.
- Fear of using cameras. There was a fear of discrimination. Since Boston Marathon, public has moved more towards public safety. Can't be just in minority residential areas.
- Using traffic and dumping cameras to assist with 911 calls when appropriate (a top future)

Mayor departs. (45:18)

Randy re-iterates Mayor's suggestions of changing the Camera Ordinance, and process delays around making changes. Ted departs.
